### Past simple tense

- the event is in the past
- the event is completely finished
- we say (or understand) the time and/or place of the event

Past simple tense – minulý čas prostý the event – událost completely finished – zcela ukončený

### 2 USE: A Series of Past Completed Actions

- I finished work, walked to the beach, and looked for a nice place to swim.
- He **arrived** from the airport at 8:00, **checked** into the hotel at 9:00, and **picked up** the others at 10:00.
- Did you add flour,
   pour in the milk,
   and then add the eggs?

completed – dokončený
look for – hledat
check – ubytovat se
– zkontrolovat,
pick up – vyzvednout
pour – nasypat
add – přidat

### 3 USE: Duration in Past

I (live) in Brazil for two years. I **lived** in Brazil for two years. Jane (study) Japanese for five years. Jane **studied** Japanese for five years. They (stay) at the beach all day. They **stayed** at the beach all day. They (not stay) at the party the entire time. They **did not stay** at the party the entire time. How long ... you (wait)? We (wait) for one hour. How long did you wait? We waited for one hour. We use the past simple tense to talk about an action or a situation - an event - in the past. The event can be **short** or **long**.

- The car <u>exploded</u> at 9.30 am yesterday.
- I <u>lived</u> in Bangkok for 10 years.
- The Jurassic period <u>lasted</u> about 62 million years.
- I <u>lived</u> in that house when I was young.

### FORM – regular verbs affirmative

the verb + (e)d

I, you, he/she/it, we, they worked

I, you, he/she/it, we, they moved přestěhoval/a/i/y

I, you, he/she/it, we, they called

pracoval/a/i/y přestěhoval/a/i/y volal/a/i/y

### Irregular verbs have various forms:

come came come

meet met met

see saw seen

# FORM – regular/irregular verbs negative

the auxiliary verb DO -> DID is necessary:

You did not (didn't) meet Debbie.

Helen did not (didn't) buy a car.

I did not (didn't) catch my train.

#### Compare with the present simple tense:

You do not (don't) meet Debbie.

Helen does not (doesn't) wash her car.

I do not (don't) finish my work.

# FORM – regular/irregular verbs interrogative

the auxiliary verb DO -> DID is necessary:

Did you meet Debbie?

**Did** Helen **buy** a car?

**Did** he **catch** his train?

#### Compare with the present simple tense:

Do you meet Debbie?

Does Helen buy a car?

Does he catch his train?
